

Patient Consent Form for Detailed Coded Record Access

It is now possible to view your GP medical record online to look at test results, Medical Codes relating to your consultations and your medical history, including current and past medication.

If you would like to have secure online access to your records, we need to make sure that you understand what this involves and that you are happy for us to use the information about you (provided below) to set up and operate the service.

The following form will take you through the things you need to think about. By signing the form you will be giving us your permission to go ahead with setting up the service for you. If you decide not to join, or wish to withdraw, it will not affect your treatment in any way.

Access is granted at the discretion of the practice. Your request for access may take up to 14 working days to process. You will be informed if access cannot be granted.

The practice follows NHS England guidance and requires two forms of identification in order to register for online services as evidence of identity and one of these must contain a photo eg passport, driving licence, bank statement. To ensure the highest level of security, we require patients requesting access to their medical record, who have already signed up to repeat prescriptions and/or appointments, to show two forms of identification again in order to have this access extended to detailed coded medical record access.

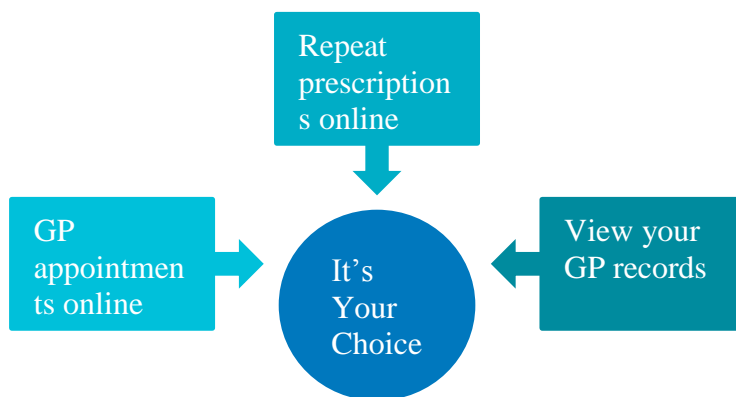

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Online Services Records Access Patient information leaflet 'It's your choice'

If you wish to, you can now use the internet to book appointments with a GP, request repeat prescriptions for any medications you take regularly and look at your medical record online. You can also still use the telephone or call in to the surgery for any of these services as well. It's your choice.

Being able to see your record online might help you to manage your medical conditions. It also means that you can even access it from anywhere in the world should you require medical treatment on holiday. If you decide not to join or wish to withdraw, this is your choice and practice staff will continue to treat you in the same way as before. This decision will not affect the quality of your care.

You will be given login details, so you will need to think of a password which is unique to you. This will ensure that only you are able to access your record – unless you choose to share your details with a family member or carer.



It will be your responsibility to keep your login details and password safe and secure. If you know or suspect that your record has been accessed by someone that you have not agreed should see it, then you should change your password immediately.

If you can't do this for some reason, we recommend that you contact the practice so that they can remove online access until you are able to reset your password.

If you print out any information from your record, it is also your responsibility to keep this secure. If you are at all worried about keeping printed copies safe, we recommend that you do not make copies at all.

The practice has the right to remove online access to services for anyone that doesn't use them responsibly.

Before you apply for online access to your record, there are some other things to consider.

Although the chances of any of these things happening are very small, you will be asked that you have read and understood the following before you are given login details.

Things to consider

Forgotten history

There may be something you have forgotten about in your record that you might find upsetting.

Abnormal results or bad news

If your GP has given you access to test results or letters, you may see something that you find upsetting to you. This may occur before you have spoken to your doctor or while the surgery is closed and you cannot contact them.

Choosing to share your information with someone

It's up to you whether or not you share your information with others – perhaps family members or carers. It's your choice, but also your responsibility to keep the information safe and secure.

Coercion

If you think you may be pressured into revealing details from your patient record to someone else against your will, it is best that you do not register for access at this time.

Misunderstood information

Your medical record is designed to be used by clinical professionals to ensure that you receive the best possible care. Some of the information within your medical record may be highly technical, written by specialists and not easily understood. If you require further clarification, please contact the surgery for a clearer explanation. Under the Data Protection Act 1998 (Fees and Miscellaneous Provisions) Regulations 2000, you will be charged a fee of £10 to view your health records at the surgery with a health professional, unless you have been seen within the last 40 days.

Information about someone else

If you spot something in the record that is not about you or notice any other errors, please log out of the system immediately and contact the practice as soon as possible.

Using a shared computer

You need to take extra care when using a shared computer to look at your GP records online. This could be at the library, at work, at university or at home. To protect your personal information from others when using a shared computer, you should:

Look around to see if other people can see what is on the computer screen. Remember, your GP records contain your personal information.

Keep your username and password secret. Just like your bank account PIN, you would not want others to know how to get into your GP records.

Make sure you log out when you finish looking at your records, so that no one else can see your personal information or change your password without your knowledge.

Understanding your records

Your records are written to help medical people look after you and so in some cases, you may not understand everything you see. If you find anything difficult to understand, as well as talking to your doctor or nurse, you can go to the NHS Choices website by using this link www.nhs.uk. NHS Choices is the NHS website for patients so you can look for information on illnesses, improving health and to find NHS services in your local area. Other websites frequently used to search for information on illnesses and test results are Patient – www.patient.info and Lab Test Online UK – www.labtestsonline.org.uk. Although these are not owned or checked by the NHS, other patients have found them useful.
